MANAGEMENT OF SOVEREIGN LANDS

North Dakota Century Code § 61-33-05 states the State Engineer shall "manage, operate, and supervise" Sovereign Lands. The State Engineer has adopted administrative rules (Administrative Code § 89-10) to create a framework to follow legislative directives in the management of North Dakota's Sovereign Lands.

Oil, gas, and related hydrocarbons beneath Sovereign Lands are administered by the North Dakota Department of Trust Lands.

REVIEW PROCESS FOR A SOVEREIGN LAND PERMIT

The permit applicant is responsible for obtaining any other local, state, or federal permits or permissions that may be necessary prior to construction of a project on Sovereign Land. During the review process, the following entities are informed about the Sovereign Land Permit Application and solicited for comments on the project:

- Local County Water Resource Districts
- North Dakota Department of Health
- North Dakota Game and Fish
- State Historical Society of North Dakota
- North Dakota State Parks and Recreation
- United States Army Corps of Engineers
- United States Fish and Wildlife Service
- Other agencies, private entities, or landowner associations as appropriate, or required by law

UNDERSTANDING SOVEREIGN LANDS

North Dakota's **SOVEREIGN LANDS** are those areas, including the beds and islands, lying within the ordinary high watermark of navigable lakes and streams. Sovereign Lands are publicallyowned lands that are managed for the benefit of the citizens of the state.

STATE NAVIGABLE WATERS

NAVIGABLE WATERS are those waters that were in fact navigable at the time of statehood. This means that they were used, or were susceptible to being used in their ordinary condition as highways for commerce, over which trade and travel was, or may have been conducted in the customary modes of trade on water.

ORDINARY HIGH WATER MARK

ORDINARY HIGH WATER MARK is that line on navigable waters below which the action of the water is frequent enough either to prevent the growth of vegetation, or to restrict its growth to predominantly wetland species. Islands in navigable waters are considered to be below the ordinary high watermark in their entirety.

Do I Need A SOVEREIGN LAND Permit (SLP)?
